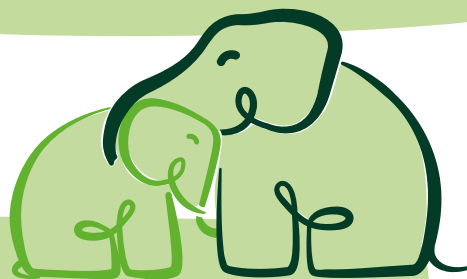

Jess, Matt and their son Elijah



Jess' story

"The Hospice gave us the space to be husband and wife again, at a time when everything else was falling apart."

When Jess met Matt, she knew he was the one. Just months later, they bought their first home and began building their life together.

That life changed suddenly when Matt became unwell. After repeated hospital visits, scans revealed multiple tumours around his major organs.

Following intensive chemotherapy, the family received the news they had hoped for: the cancer was gone. But just two months later it returned, this time in Matt's brain.

When Matt came home, Jess found herself caring for him while also looking after their young son, Elijah who was just 18 months old at the time.

"We were in constant fight or flight mode," she says. "I wasn't just his wife anymore, I was his carer."

Although Matt had initially wanted to die in hospital, worried home would become a place of sadness, everything changed when Nathan, a Clinical Specialist from Thames Hospice, visited.

"Matt instantly felt at ease," Jess recalls. "He agreed to come into the Hospice, and I felt immediate relief."

For Jess, Thames Hospice gave them something priceless. The chance to stop being patient and carer and simply be husband and wife again.

"Our world had been turned upside down, but in those final weeks the Hospice team helped us focus on the time we had left together."

She remembers the small but powerful details - Matt's room overlooking the lake, the space for Elijah to play, and the kindness of every member of staff.

Matt spent almost three weeks at Thames Hospice. With no visiting restrictions, Jess stayed by his side day and night, even sleeping beside him in his room.

"When Matt slipped away, I was cuddled up next to him, exactly where I should have been."

Today, Jess remains closely connected to Thames Hospice. In honour of Matt and the care her family received, she is now leading the charge as our Project Manager on Trunks across the Thames, helping raise vital funds so more local families can receive the same extraordinary support.

"After everything Matt and I went through, I wanted to be part of something that reflects what the Hospice gave us: care, dignity and hope in its truest sense. Being involved in Trunks across the Thames feels like a way of honouring that experience, and of helping other families feel supported when they need it most."

"Elephants represent empathy, connection and memory and the importance of not facing death alone. That mirrors my experience of Thames Hospice."

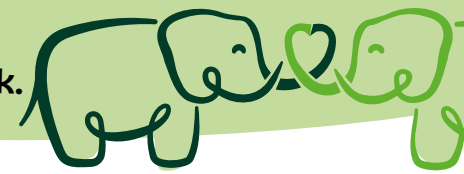

Small trunks, **BIG** conversations

Across our community, something remarkable is growing.

Around 60 mini elephants are being created by 50 organisations, including 40 nurseries, schools and colleges, representing the creativity of more than 30,000 young people.

Care homes, Rotary clubs, sports teams and community groups are also taking part, each adding their own voice to the herd.

Every small trunk carries a big story, as people of all ages design and share their elephants as part of Trunks across the Thames.

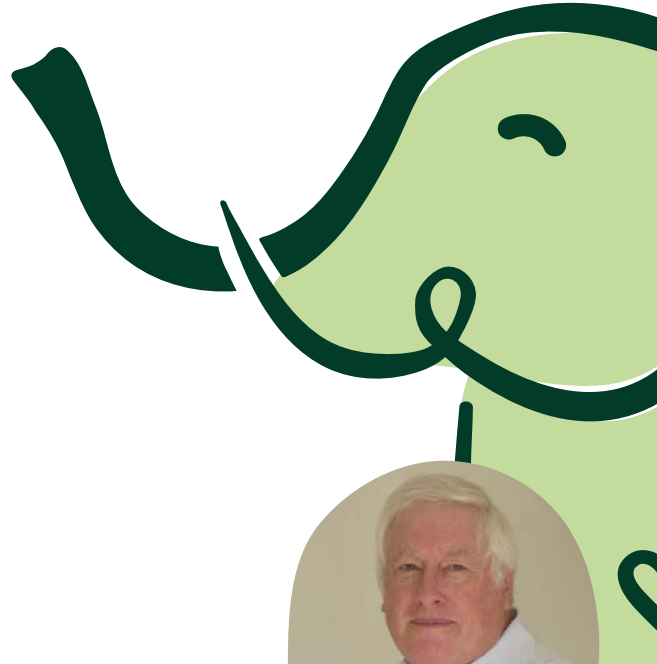
But this is about more than art.

At Thames Hospice, we know conversations around grief, loss and care can feel difficult, especially for young people. That's why our learning programme, sponsored by Maidenhead Golf Club, works with schools and community groups to gently open up these discussions.

Through carefully designed resources, we are helping teachers and families create safe spaces to explore feelings, ask questions and begin to address 'the elephant in the room'.

Because this trail isn't just about elephants.

It's about giving a new generation the confidence to talk openly, support one another, and understand that even the smallest voices can lead to the biggest conversations.

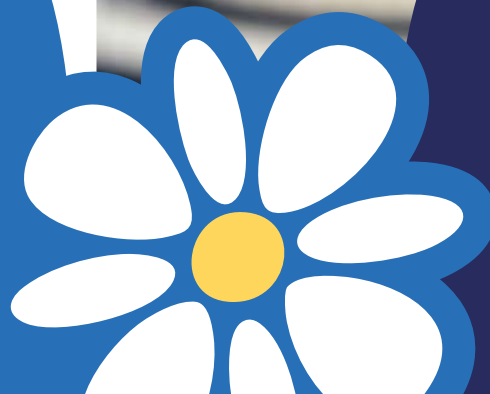

Some of our teams took moments out of their day to add their marks. As they painted, conversations naturally turned to the people we care for, and the wonderful communities we are proud to serve.



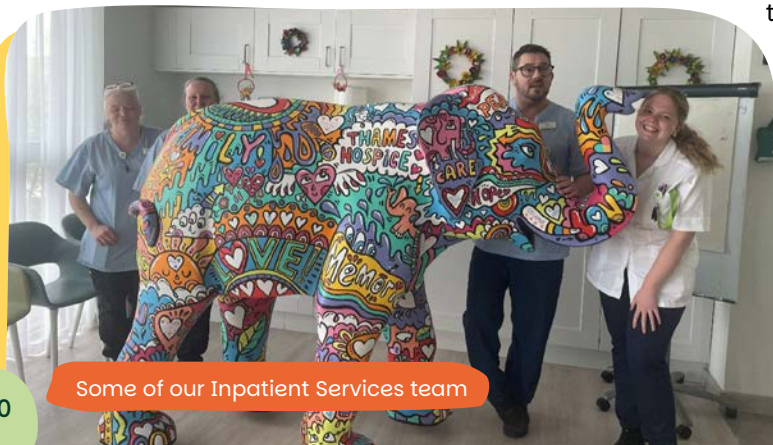
“Every mark adds a little joy and personality,” Luke explains. “She celebrates creativity, kindness and togetherness. Life is beautiful when we create together.”

Care without borders

For our clinical teams, inclusive care is part of everyday practice.

Shirlie Nicoll, from our night team, came in especially to take part. She says the experience reflects the values at the heart of the Hospice.

“We don't discriminate in who we care for or how we care for them,” Shirlie explains. “We meet patients and their families where they're at and walk alongside them, whatever their background, beliefs or circumstances.”

Our doctors echo this commitment.

“Good hospice care starts with listening,” one explains. “Understanding culture, faith and family life helps us provide care that truly fits the person. Hospice care should feel accessible and welcoming to everyone.”

That sense of connection continues beyond the time we care for someone.

Shirlie speaks warmly about Light up a Life, our annual memorial event, where families come together to remember loved ones.

“It's incredibly special to see families again,” she says. “You can really feel that connection; people we have cared for and continue to support.”

Trunks across the Thames reminds us that care, like the River itself, flows through time, crossing boundaries, reaching across generations, and continuing to offer comfort wherever and whenever it is needed. When care crosses borders, hope follows, and everyone belongs.

Meet some of the artists

Charlie Mackesy

Internationally acclaimed artist and author of **The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse**, Charlie Mackesy, is contributing to the Trunks across the Thames summer art trail by designing and hand-painting one of the elephants. His work, known for its compassion and ability to make people feel less alone, reflects the very heart of Thames Hospice's mission.

“Hello. I've discovered Thames Hospice plays such a compassionate and vital part of many lives, giving dignified end-of-life care to patients and their families so they never feel alone. They offer kindness, comfort, hope and connection - my favourite things - and need support, which is why I am happy to play a part in their Trunks across the Thames summer art trail.”

Meet our mini elephant **Miles**, part of the project's schools initiative, designed by Alison Partridge.

Alison's journey with Thames Hospice began as a customer and volunteer, where her love of creativity and community inspired her to get more involved. Now Head of Finance Management at the Hospice, she has combined her professional skills and artistic talents to make a real difference to the work of the organisation.



“I wanted to make something fun and inspiring for students. I was given a little green elephant that was going to be travelling around so I gave him some mismatched trainers with a logo that spelt 'Kind' from one side and 'Care' from the other. From there, it grew into this colourful design full of hearts, flowers and hidden elephants with big expressive eyes. The messaging was also very important so his blanket was decorated with the words 'Elephants never forget' and 'I will carry you for miles', symbolising how loved ones are never truly lost, but instead are carried with us in our hearts wherever we go. The experience was as delightful as it was creative. It was an absolute joy to work on, and I feel very proud to be part of such a fantastic event.”

“The vibrant leaves and flowers on Hope represent a vision of life and the uncertainty we all experience. While the monuments I featured were very neat, life isn't always like that, and I wanted to reflect this on Hope.”

Hope, our striking elephant sculpture, is the star of the trail, brought to life by talented tattoo artist Jess Garrett, a Burnham native with a strong connection to the Hospice. Symbolising compassion and stability, Hope reflects the care we provide while celebrating the shared heritage of Slough and Windsor. Jess wove together local landmarks and history, highlighting favourites like Windsor's crooked house and Slough's claim to the modern wheelie bin, using the curve of the River Thames along the elephant's trunk to unite the design.

"Mum was in the Hospice in early 2025, and they made an incredibly difficult time so much easier. They took away all the worry, the fear, and the anxiety.

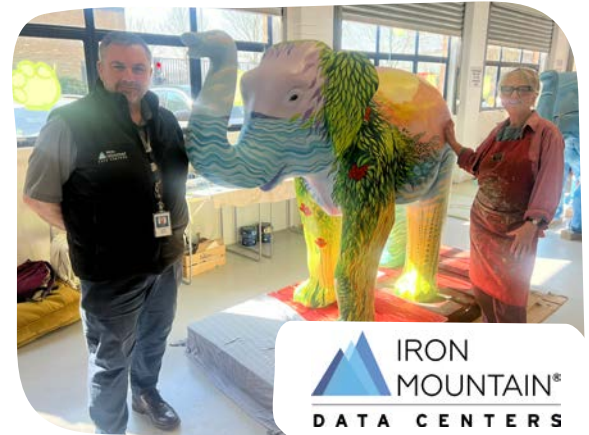

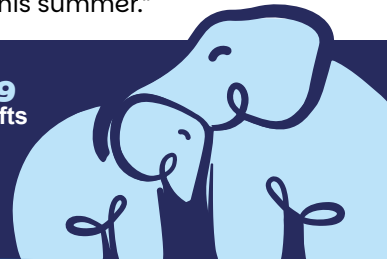

After 20 years of running his own business, Michael decided it was time for a change.

Having also spent time caring for a close family member, he was looking for a role with purpose, and Thames Hospice felt like the perfect fit.

He had already built a connection with the organisation as a regular donor. "I'd always donated to my local Thames Hospice store and loved the staff there," he says. "It just felt like somewhere I wanted to be."

After a short spell at the Dedworth store, Michael has now taken on the role of Assistant Manager in Maidenhead, where his days are busy and varied.

"One of the key parts of my day is processing donations," he explains. "That involves meeting customers, talking to them about what they've brought in, handling Gift Aid, and then sorting items

ready for the shop floor. It's constant – just as one customer leaves, someone else is coming through the door."

He is continually impressed by the generosity and organisation of the local community.

"I'm always amazed by our customers, who donate such good-quality items, from clothing to homeware such as crockery and glassware. So many come in with their Gift Aid labels already prepared, which makes everything much easier."

Michael's role goes far beyond donations. His day also includes serving customers, creating visual displays, and supporting the 51 volunteers who play a vital role in the store.

But above all, it's the people who make the role special. "I love the social interaction," he says. "You meet such a wide range of people every day, and that's a big part of what makes the job so rewarding."

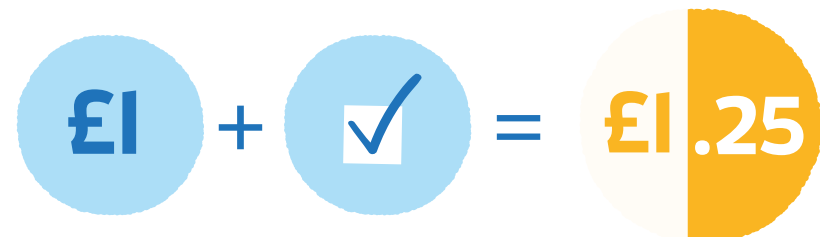

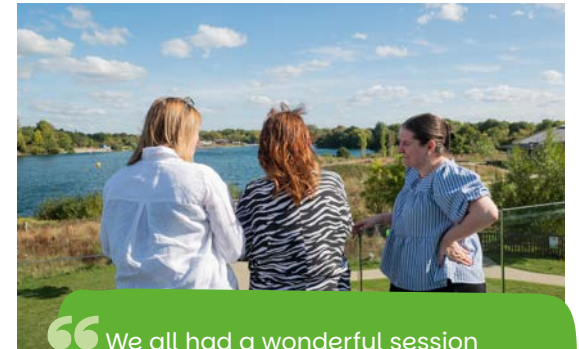
